MANAGER'S REPORT

Performance Review

USD Class

The Fund has registered a return of 8.76% since commencement compared to the benchmark return of 14.03%, underperforming by 5.27%. For the financial year under review, the Fund registered a 4.67% return compared to the benchmark return of 6.15%. The Fund thus underperformed the benchmark by 1.48%. The NAV per unit of the Fund as at 31 May 2025 was USD0.4795 while the NAV as at 31 May 2024 was USD0.4963. During the period, the Fund has declared a total income distribution of USD0.0396 per unit.

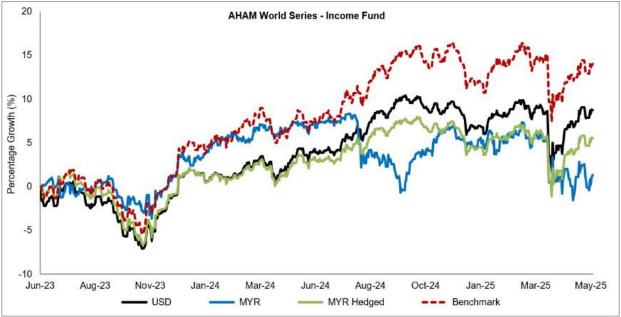
MYR Class

The Fund has registered a return of 1.34% since commencement compared to the benchmark return of 14.03%, underperforming by 12.69%. For the financial year under review, the Fund registered a -5.37% return compared to the benchmark return of 6.15%. The Fund thus underperformed the benchmark by 11.52%. The NAV per unit of the Fund as at 31 May 2025 was MYR0.4462 while the NAV as at 31 May 2024 was MYR0.5121. During the period, the Fund has declared a total income distribution of MYR0.0396 per unit.

MYR Hedged-class

The Fund has registered a return of 5.56% since commencement compared to the benchmark return of 14.03%, underperforming by 8.47%. For the financial year under review, the Fund registered a 2.43% return compared to the benchmark return of 6.15%. The Fund thus underperformed the benchmark by 3.72%. The NAV per unit of the Fund as at 31 May 2025 was MYR0.4644 while the NAV as at 31 May 2024 was MYR0.4921. During the period, the Fund has declared a total income distribution of MYR0.0396 per unit.





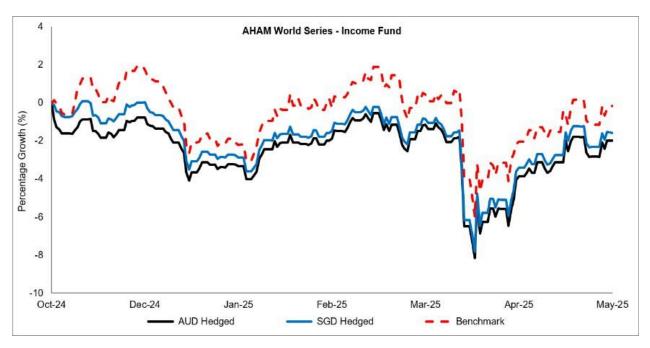
AUD Hedged-class

The Fund has registered a return of -1.99% since commencement compared to the benchmark return of -0.17%, underperforming by 1.82%. The NAV per unit of the Fund as at 31 May 2025 was AUD0.4668 while the initial NAV was AUD0.5000. During the period, the Fund has declared a total income distribution of AUD0.0231 per unit.

SGD Hedged-class

The Fund has registered a return of -1.58% since commencement compared to the benchmark return of -0.17%, underperforming by 1.41%. The NAV per unit of the Fund as at 31 May 2025 was SGD0.4689 while the initial NAV was SGD0.5000. During the period, the Fund has declared a total income distribution of SGD0.0231 per unit.

Strategies Employed

The Target Fund invests in a diversified portfolio of transferable securities encompassing equity securities and long-and-short-term debt securities.

Market Review

During the financial year under review, financial markets were shaped by a dynamic mix of economic data releases, monetary policy shifts, geopolitical developments, and evolving investor sentiment. The period began with cautious optimism, as key data points suggested the U.S. economy was gradually progressing toward a soft landing. In June 2024, investors focused closely on jobless claims and the Core Personal Consumption Expenditures ("PCE") inflation index. Initial jobless claims edged lower, pointing to continued resilience in the labor market, while Core PCE rose 2.6% year-over-year in May, marking the slowest pace of increase in six months. These developments reassured investors and helped both equities and fixed income deliver modest positive returns. The MSCI USA High Dividend Yield Index returned 0.21%, while the Bloomberg U.S. Aggregate Bond Index gained 0.95% for the month. Within equities, Consumer Discretionary and Information Technology sectors led gains, while Utilities and Materials underperformed. In fixed income, both investment grade and high yield segments benefited from declining Treasury yields, with the 10-year yield falling to 4.36%.

Economic growth in the second quarter came in at a solid 2.8% annualized pace, but other indicators began to show signs of cooling. Labor market and manufacturing data pointed to potential downside risks, with the Core PCE inflation metric easing to a 2.3% annualized rate for the three months ending in June—further progress toward the Federal Reserve's 2% target. The Federal Reserve System ("Fed") kept rates unchanged in July, as expected, but signaled the possibility of rate cuts as soon as September, citing the improving inflation backdrop and softening labor market conditions. Second-quarter earnings reports further supported market sentiment, showing a broadening of growth across sectors, particularly in Financials and Health Care. The equity market experienced heightened volatility in July, with a significant sell-off in megacap Communications Services and Technology stocks. However, this rotation benefited sectors like Financials, Utilities, and Industrials. Despite sector-level divergence, a late-month rally helped lift the overall market, and the MSCI USA High Dividend Yield Index rose 2.86%. Fixed income also enjoyed gains as the 10-year Treasury yield dropped to 4.10%, marking the largest one-month decline since December 2023. Credit spreads remained tight, underscoring the need for a selective approach in fixed income investing.

In August, equity performance continued to broaden, with strong contributions from Consumer Staples, Healthcare, Financials, and Utilities. The Bloomberg U.S. Aggregate Index returned 1.44% as bond markets also benefited from declining yields and expectations for monetary easing. Following the Federal Reserve's Jackson Hole symposium, investors gained confidence that the central bank would prioritize preventing further labor market deterioration, signaling a shift from an exclusive focus on inflation control to a more balanced dual mandate approach.

The Federal Reserve initiated its rate-cutting cycle in September, lowering the Fed Funds rate by 50 basis points to a range of 4.75% to 5.00%. While the central bank projected two additional 25-basis-point cuts in 2024, it left open the possibility of larger reductions should labor market weakness persist. Non-farm payrolls data continued to reflect softening conditions, while Core PCE inflation data indicated further progress toward the Fed's target. Despite geopolitical tensions and early concerns about the U.S. economy, equity markets closed the month with gains, supported by the rate cut and a revised second-quarter Gross Domestic Product ("GDP") growth of 3.0%. Equity market breadth remained a positive theme, with Consumer Discretionary, Industrials, and Utilities all contributing meaningfully. In fixed income, high-quality bonds outperformed their non-investment grade counterparts, and a sharp drop in short-term yields led to an uninversion of the yield curve.

October brought renewed volatility as cooling expectations for further aggressive rate cuts and uncertainties around the upcoming U.S. presidential election weighed on markets. Though inflation data continued to move in the right direction and the unemployment rate held steady at 4.1%, Treasury yields rose, pushing the 2- and 10-year yields above 4%. This climb resulted in negative returns across both equity and fixed income markets. The MSCI USA High Dividend Yield Index declined 1.55%, while the Bloomberg U.S. Aggregate Bond Index fell 2.48%. Still, some bright spots emerged in earnings season, with strong results from sectors including Information Technology, Healthcare, and Utilities.

In the aftermath of the November elections, markets responded positively to the potential for pro-growth policies such as extensions of the 2017 tax cuts and reductions in regulatory burdens. This post-election optimism drove a broad equity rally, despite lingering uncertainty around future fiscal and regulatory policy. Fixed income markets also saw modest gains, aided by a late-month drop in yields following the announcement of Scott Bessent as the new Treasury Secretary nominee. Nonetheless, with credit spreads still near historical tights, expectations for significant bond price appreciation remained muted, even as elevated yields offered income opportunities.

However, in December, markets faced a pullback across both equities and bonds. Rising long-term Treasury yields and a reassessment of the Fed's likely path in 2025—with fewer rate cuts now anticipated—dampened investor enthusiasm. Despite this difficult close to the year, equity market fundamentals remained broadly constructive. Although valuations appeared elevated, forward returns were expected to be driven more by earnings growth and dividend income. Analysts also anticipated a wider universe of equity opportunities in 2025, moving beyond the narrow group of dominant mega-cap stocks that had led in prior years. Fixed income markets remained attractive from a yield perspective, though tight credit spreads continued to limit total return potential, particularly in investment grade and high yield corporate bonds.

By January 2025, the U.S. economy showed signs of resilience, though policy uncertainty led to mixed market outcomes. Real GDP for the fourth quarter of 2024 grew by 2.3%, largely on the back of strong consumer spending. However, Core PCE held steady at 2.8%, suggesting that progress toward the Fed's inflation target had stalled somewhat. In response, the Fed kept rates unchanged, emphasizing the need for further improvements on the inflation front. Technology stocks came under significant pressure following the launch of DeepSeek, a new Chinese artificial intelligence ("Al") chatbot, which raised questions about the return on investment for U.S. hyperscaler firms. Despite this, 10 of 11 S&P 500 sectors posted gains, led by Healthcare, Financials, Materials, and Communication Services. Bond yields remained volatile, with the 10-year Treasury ending the month at 4.54%, despite briefly touching 4.8%. As such, managing interest rate exposure and diversifying across sectors, particularly in Agency Mortgage-Backed Securities, became increasingly important for bond investors.

The economy showed more pronounced signs of deceleration in March, with disappointing readings in Institute for Supply Management ("ISM") Manufacturing, New Orders, and Employment indexes. Consumer sentiment deteriorated sharply, with both the University of Michigan and Conference Board indexes falling to multi-year lows. Amid this backdrop of increasing uncertainty, diversified portfolios—incorporating government bonds, mortgage-backed securities ("MBS"), high-quality and high yield credits, and equity sector diversification—proved resilient. The fund's flexible allocation strategy enabled it to adapt to bottom-up opportunities even in choppy market conditions.

April was marked by elevated volatility, primarily driven by tariff policy uncertainty. Equities suffered significant declines, with the MSCI USA High Dividend Yield Index falling 4.36%. In contrast, fixed income saw modest gains, with the Bloomberg U.S. Aggregate Index returning 0.39%. Despite a late-month recovery, investor

sentiment remained fragile. Financials, Energy, and Industrials were particularly hard-hit, but valuations became increasingly attractive. Meanwhile, the sell-off in large-cap technology stocks created potential entry points for long-term investors.

May brought a more constructive tone to the markets, supported by the postponement of tariff implementations and improved investor sentiment. Equities rebounded strongly, although valuations approached prior peaks. Interest rate volatility returned as fiscal concerns pushed long-term yields higher. While the rate environment created challenges, it also enhanced opportunities in Agency MBS, which offered appealing yields and valuable diversification. As the tariff deadline approached and trade talks remained unsettled, volatility loomed, yet nimble and diversified strategies remained well-positioned to navigate the uncertain path ahead.

Investment Outlook

The investment outlook of the Target Fund Manager reflects a cautiously optimistic stance grounded in active risk management and a focus on income generation. As of the latest review, the Target Fund has returned 2.11% year-to-date, with a notable 2.01% gain in May alone. Its dividend yield remains attractive at 8.42%, and its five-year annualised return of 6.47% has outperformed the 5.16% return of its peer group, underscoring the manager's ability to deliver consistent results over time.

Market dynamics in recent months have played a significant role in shaping the Target Fund's positioning. May saw a sharp rebound in equity markets, driven by delays in tariff implementation, improved investor sentiment, and supportive economic data. However, the Target Fund Manager remains conscious of the limitations to further equity upside. With valuations now approaching previous highs and economic growth showing signs of potential deceleration, there is recognition that the easy gains may be behind us. In this context, the Target Fund Manager appears to be tempering expectations and adopting a more selective, valuation-conscious approach.

The current market environment is also characterised by rising interest rate volatility, largely due to concerns surrounding the growing U.S. fiscal deficit. Longer-term yields have moved higher in response, creating new opportunities in fixed income. In particular, the Target Fund Manager has identified Agency Mortgage-Backed Securities as a compelling area of the market, offering competitive yields and enhanced diversification benefits at a time when traditional investment grade corporate spreads are relatively tight. As such, the Target Fund has reallocated part of its fixed income exposure by trimming select investment grade corporates and increasing holdings in Agency MBS. Investment grade fixed income now represents 26% of the total portfolio, with 14% in corporates, 6% in U.S. Treasuries, and 6% in Agency MBS.

Overall portfolio allocation remains balanced, with 48% in equities and 50% in fixed income, suggesting a neutral stance in terms of risk appetite. The average portfolio duration is approximately 4.7 years, in line with the benchmark, and the Target Fund Manager does not currently hold a strong directional view on interest rates. Instead, the emphasis is on bottom-up security selection, indicating a preference for relative value and fundamentals over macro-driven positioning.

In the equity sleeve, the Target Fund has continued to focus on high-quality, resilient businesses. Additions have been made selectively across the Healthcare, Information Technology, and Consumer Staples sectors, which are viewed as offering a combination of defensiveness and long-term growth potential. The equity allocation is split evenly between common stocks and hybrid instruments such as equity-linked notes and convertible preferred, providing both income and upside potential while managing volatility.

The Target Fund Manager also acknowledges the possibility of renewed market volatility as the 90-day tariff deadline approaches and trade negotiations remain uncertain. While recent developments have lifted sentiment, the outlook remains clouded by policy risks and broader macroeconomic headwinds. In this context, the Target Fund Manager is leaning into the flexibility of the strategy—remaining diversified across asset classes and sectors, while positioning the portfolio to respond to shifting opportunities and risks.

Taken together, the Target Fund's current positioning reflects a pragmatic and disciplined approach to investing in an environment that offers both opportunities and challenges. The Target Fund Manager is not making aggressive bets but is instead focused on maintaining balance, harvesting income, and seeking pockets of value through careful security selection. The outlook, while not overly bullish, is grounded in a recognition of the need for adaptability and the importance of diversification, especially as markets navigate through heightened fiscal, geopolitical, and economic uncertainty.

State of Affairs of the Fund

There is neither any significant change to the state affairs of the Fund nor any circumstances that materially affect any interests of the unit holders during the financial year under review.

Soft Commissions received from Broker

Soft commissions received from broker may be retained by the management company only if the :-

- (i) goods and services provided are of demonstrable benefit to unit holders of the Fund; and
- goods and services are in the form of research and advisory services that assists in the decision-making process.

During the financial year under review, no soft commission was received by the Manager on behalf of the Fund.

No cross trade transactions have been carried out during the financial year under review.

MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2025

The following accounting policies have been used in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

A BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS") and International Financial Reporting Standards. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities (including derivative financial instruments) at fair value through profit or loss.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS and International Financial Reporting Standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reported financial year. It also requires the Manager to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. Although these estimates and judgement are based on the Manager's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note M.

(a) Standards, amendments to published standards and interpretations that are applicable and effective:

There are no standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for annual periods beginning on 1 January 2024 that have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

- (b) Standards and amendments that have been issued that are applicable to the Fund but not yet effective:
 - Amendments to MFRS 9 and MFRS 7 'Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments' (effective 1 January 2026)
 - The amendments clarify that financial assets are derecognised when the rights to the cash flows expire or when the asset is transferred, and financial liabilities are derecognised at the settlement date (i.e. when the liability is extinguished or qualifies for derecognition);
 - There is an optional exception to derecognise a financial liability at a date earlier than the settlement date if the cash transfer takes place through an electronic payment system, provided that all the specified criteria are met;
 - The amendments also clarify and add further guidance for assessing whether a financial asset meets the solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI") criterion;
 - There are additional new disclosures for certain instruments with contractual terms that can change cash flows (such as some financial instruments with features linked to the achievement of environment, social and governance targets); and
 - The amendments update the disclosures for equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVOCI").

 - MFRS 18 'Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements' (effective 1 January 2027) replaces MFRS 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements'
 - The new MFRS introduces a new structure of profit or loss statement.
 - i. Income and expenses are classified into 3 new main categories:
 - Operating category which typically includes results from the main business activities;
 - Investing category that presents the results of investments in associates and joint ventures and other assets that generate a return largely independently of other resources; and
 - Financing category that presents income and expenses from financing liabilities
 - ii. Entities are required to present two new specified subtotals: 'Operating profit or loss' and 'Profit or loss before financing and income taxes'.
 - Management-defined performance measures are disclosed in a single note and reconciled to the most similar specified subtotal in MFRS Accounting Standards.
 - Changes to the guidance on aggregation and disaggregation which focus on grouping items based on their shared characteristics.

The Fund is currently still assessing the effect of the above standards and amendments. No other new standards or amendments to standards are expected to have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

B INCOME RECOGNITION

Dividend income

Dividend income for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as part of gross dividend income on the ex-dividend date, when the right to receive the dividend has been established.

Realised gains and losses on sale of investments

For collective investment schemes ("CIS") realised gains and losses on sale of investments are accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the investments, determined on a weighted average cost basis.

C TAXATION

Current tax expense is determined according to the Malaysian tax laws at the current rate based upon the taxable profits earned during the financial year.

MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2025 (CONTINUED)

D DISTRIBUTION

A distribution to the Fund's unit holders is accounted for as a finance cost in the statement of comprehensive income. A proposed distribution is recognised as a liability in the period in which it is approved by the Trustee of the Fund.

At the Manager's discretion, the Fund may distribute (1) realised income, (2) realised capital gains, (3) unrealised income, (4) unrealised capital gains, (5) capital, or (6) a combination of any of the above.

E FUNCTIONAL AND PRESENTATION CURRENCY

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the "functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in United States Dollar ("USD"), which is the Fund's functional and presentation currency.

F FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATION

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where items are re-measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year/period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income, except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

G FINANCIAL ASSETS AND FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

(i) Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured at fair value through profit or loss, and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its investments based on both the Fund's business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets' performance and to make decisions. The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income.

The contractual cash flows of the Fund's debt securities are solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI"). However, these securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Fund's business model's objective. Consequently, all investments and derivatives not designated as hedging instruments are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

G FINANCIAL ASSETS AND FINANCIAL LIABILITIES (CONTINUED)

(i) Classification (continued)

Investment in CIS have contractual cash flows that do not represent SPPI, and therefore are classified as financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents and amount due from Manager as financial assets measured at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

The Fund classifies amount due to broker, amount due to Manager, amount due to Trustee, payables for auditors' remuneration, tax agent's fee, fund accounting fee and other payables and accruals as financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

(ii) Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade-date – the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Investments are initially recognised at fair value.

Financial liabilities, within the scope of MFRS 9, are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or have been transferred and the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' category including the effects of foreign transactions are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within 'net (loss)/gain on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' in the period which they arise.

Investment in CIS are valued at the last published net asset value ("NAV") per unit at the date of the statement of financial position.

Financial assets measured at amortised cost and other financial liabilities, except forward foreign currency contracts, are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

G FINANCIAL ASSETS AND FINANCIAL LIABILITIES (CONTINUED)

(iii) Impairment

The Fund's financial assets measured at amortised cost are subject to expected credit losses. The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. Management considers both historical analysis and forward-looking information in determining any expected credit loss. Management considers the probability of default to be close to zero as these instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on 12-month expected credit losses as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by management as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due.

Definition of default and credit-impaired financial assets

The Fund defines a financial instrument as default, which is fully aligned with the definition of credit-impaired, when it meets one or more of the following criteria:

Quantitative criteria:

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit-impaired.

Qualitative criteria:

The debtor meets unlikeliness to pay criteria, which indicates the debtor is in significant financial difficulty. The Fund considers the following instances:

- the debtor is in breach of financial covenants;
- concessions have been made by the lender relating to the debtor's financial difficulty;
- it is becoming probable that the debtor will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganization; and
- the debtor is insolvent.

Financial instruments that are credit-impaired are assessed on individual basis.

Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on unavailability of debtor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to repay the amount.

The Fund may write off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in bad debt recoveries. There are no write-offs/recoveries during the financial year/period.

H CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For the purpose of statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash and bank balances which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

I AMOUNT DUE FROM/(TO) BROKER

Amounts due from and to broker represent receivables for securities sold and payables for securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet settled or delivered on the statement of financial position date respectively. The due from broker balance is held for collection. Refer to Note G for accounting policy on recognition and measurement.

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit-impaired.

Significant financial difficulties of the broker, probability that the broker will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default in payments are all considered indicators that a loss allowance may be required.

J CREATION AND CANCELLATION OF UNITS

The unit holders' capital to the Fund meets the definition of puttable instruments classified as financial liability under MFRS 132 "Financial Instruments: Presentation".

The Fund issues cancellable units, in five classes of units, known respectively as the AUD-Hedged class, MYR Class, MYR Hedged-class, SGD Hedged-class, and USD Class which are cancelled at the unit holder's option and do not have identical features. The units are classified as financial liabilities. Cancellable units can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash equal to a proportionate share of the Fund's NAV of respective classes. The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at the statement of financial position if the unit holder exercises the right to put back the unit to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at the unit holder's option at prices based on the Fund's NAV per unit of respective classes at the close of business on the relevant dealing day. The Fund's NAV per unit of respective classes is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unit holders of respective classes with the total number of outstanding units of respective classes.

K DERIVATIVE FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

A derivative financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to both a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

The Fund's derivative financial instruments comprise forward foreign currency contracts. Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value. Financial derivative position will be "marked to market" at the close of each valuation day. Foreign exchange gains and losses on the derivative financial instruments are recognised in profit or loss when settled or at the date of the statement of financial position at which time they are included in the measurement of the derivative financial instrument. Derivative instruments that have a positive fair value and negative fair value are presented as financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss and financial liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss, respectively.

The fair value of forward foreign currency contracts are determined using forward exchange rates at the date of statements of financial position, with the resulting value discounted back to present value.

The method of recognising the resulting gain or loss depends on whether the derivative is designated as a hedging instrument, and the nature of the item being hedged. Derivatives that do not qualify for hedge accounting are classified as financial assets/liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss.

L DECREASE IN NET ASSETS ATTRIBUTABLE TO UNIT HOLDERS

Income not distributed is included in net assets attributable to unit holders.

M CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, rarely equal the related actual results. To enhance the information contents on the estimates, certain key variables that are anticipated to have material impacts to the Fund's results and financial position are tested for sensitivity to changes in the underlying parameters.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated by the Manager and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

In undertaking any of the Fund's investment, the Manager will ensure that all assets of the Fund under management will be valued appropriately, that is at fair value and in compliance with the Securities Commission's ("SC") Guidelines on Unlisted Capital Market Products under the Lodge and Launch Framework.

Functional currency

Due to mixed factors in determining the functional currency of the Fund, the Manager has used its judgement to determine the functional currency that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions, events and conditions and have determined the functional currency to be in USD primarily due to the following factors:

- i) The Fund's sole investment is in a collective investment scheme denominated in USD.
- ii) Significant portion of cash is denominated in USD for the purpose of making settlement of the foreign trades.
- iii) Significant portion of the Fund's expenses are denominated in USD.

N REALISED AND UNREALISED PORTIONS OF DECREASE IN NET ASSETS ATTRIBUTABLE TO UNIT HOLDERS

1 INFORMATION ON THE FUND

The Unit Trust Fund was constituted under the name AHAM World Series – Income Fund (the "Fund") pursuant to the execution of a Deed dated 2 May 2023 (the "Deed") entered into between AHAM Asset Management Berhad (the "Manager") and Deutsche Trustees Malaysia Berhad (the "Trustee"). The Fund commenced operations on 19 June 2023 and will continue its operations until terminated by the Trustee as provided under Clause 11.3 of the Deed.

The Fund may invest in any of the following assets, subject to the Deed, the Fund's objective, the Guidelines, the requirements of the SC and all relevant laws:

- (a) CIS;
- (b) Money market instruments;
- (c) Deposits;
- (d) Derivatives; and
- (e) Any other form of investments as may be determined by the Manager from time to time that is in line with the Fund's objective.

All investments will be subjected to the SC's Guidelines on Unlisted Capital Market Products under the Lodge and Launch Framework., the Deed and the objective of the Fund.

The main objective of the Fund is to achieve capital appreciation and provide regular income over medium to long term period.

The Manager is a company incorporated in Malaysia. The principal activities of the Manager are establishment and management of unit trust funds, exchange-traded funds and private retirement schemes as well as providing fund management services to private clients.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Manager on 28 July 2025.

Market risk

(a) Price risk

Price risk arises mainly from the uncertainty about future prices of investments. It represents the potential loss the Fund might suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements. The Manager manages the risk of unfavourable changes in prices by continuous monitoring of the performance and risk profile of the investment portfolio.

(b) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk arises from the effects of fluctuations in the prevailing levels of market interest rates on the fair value of financial assets and liabilities and future cash flows.

The Fund's exposure to the interest rate risk is mainly confined to short term placement with a financial institution. The Manager overcomes this exposure by way of maintaining deposits on short-term basis.

The Fund's exposure to interest rate risk associated with deposits with licensed financial institutions is not material as the deposits are held on a short-term basis.

As at 31 May 2025 and 31 May 2024, the Fund is not exposed to any interest rate risk.

(c) Currency risk

Currency risk is associated with investments denominated in foreign currencies. When the foreign currencies fluctuate in an unfavourable movement against United States Dollar, the investments will face currency losses in addition to the capital gain/(loss). The Manager will evaluate the likely directions of the foreign currency versus United States Dollar based on considerations of economic fundamentals such as interest rate differentials, balance of payments position, debt levels and technical chart considerations.

Credit risk

Capital risk

The capital of the Fund is represented by net assets attributable to unit holders. The amount of net assets attributable to unit holders can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily subscriptions and redemptions at the discretion of unit holders. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for unit holders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the development of the investment activities of the Fund.

3 FAIR VALUE ESTIMATION

Financial instruments comprise financial assets and financial liabilities. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets (such as trading securities) is based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the period end date. The Fund utilises the last traded price for financial assets which falls within the bid-ask spread.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

The fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques.

(i) Fair value hierarchy

The table below analyses financial instruments carried at fair value. The different levels have been defined as follows:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1)
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (Level 2)
- Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (Level 3)

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety. If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that require significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a Level 3 measurement. Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgement, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

The determination of what constitutes 'observable' requires significant judgement by the Fund. The Fund considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.

Investments whose values are based on published market prices in active markets, and are therefore classified within Level 1, include collective investment scheme. The Fund does not adjust the published prices for these instruments.

Financial instruments that trade in markets that are not considered to be active but are valued based on quoted market prices, dealer quotations or alternative pricing sources supported by observable inputs are classified within Level 2. These include forward foreign currency contracts. As Level 2 instruments include positions that are not traded in active markets and/or are subject to transfer restrictions, valuations may be adjusted to reflect illiquidity and/or non-transferability, which are generally based on available market information.

(ii) The carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, amount due from Manager and all current liabilities, except for forward foreign currency contracts, are a reasonable approximation of the fair values due to their short-term nature.

4 MANAGEMENT FEE

In accordance with the Deed, the Manager is entitled to a management fee at a rate not exceeding 3.00% per annum on the NAV of the Fund, calculated on a daily basis.

For the financial year ended 31 May 2025, the management fee is recognised at a rate of 1.80% (financial period from 9 May 2024 (date of launch) to 31 May 2024: 1.80%) per annum on the NAV of the Fund, calculated on a daily basis as stated in the Fund's Information Memorandum.

There will be no further liability to the Manager in respect of management fee other than the amounts recognised above.

5 TRUSTEE FEE

In accordance with the Deed, the Trustee is entitled to an annual fee at a rate not exceeding 0.10% per annum on the NAV of the Fund, calculated on a daily basis.
