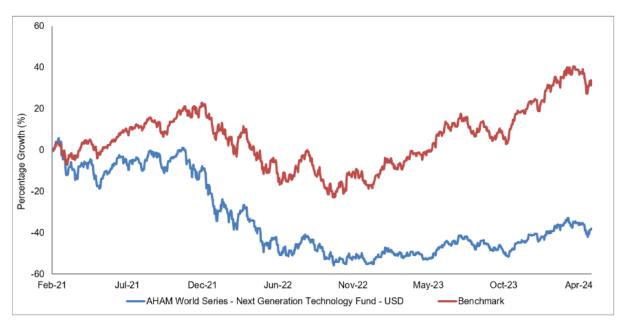

Figure 1: Movement of the Fund versus the Benchmark

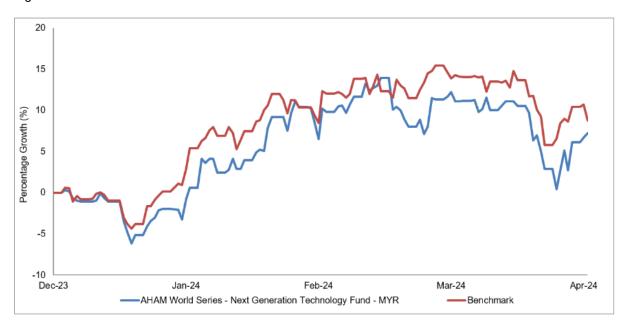

Figure 1: Movement of the Fund versus the Benchmark

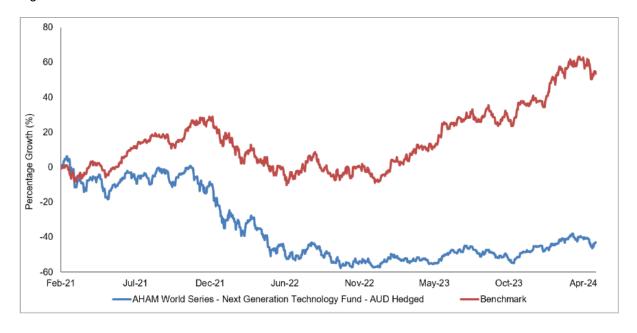

Figure 1: Movement of the Fund versus the Benchmark

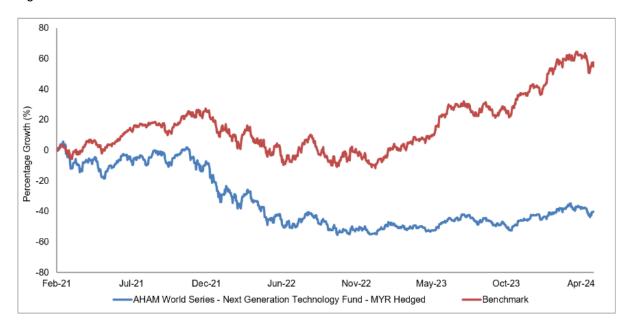

Strategies Employed

The investment team believes that emerging technology is reshaping industries across the spectrum, as we anticipate investment in disruptive technologies to grow in the coming years. The Fund aims to capture the alpha opportunities created by industry-disrupting, emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence, cloud computing and the internet of things.

Today, disruption has gone well beyond just the technology sector, as technology companies seek to make an impact on any industry that is poised to benefit from operational innovation, such as AI in digital healthcare or autonomous vehicles in the automobile sector. As such, the Fund currently holds positions across more than 24 GICS industries, where innovative firms are reshaping the landscape of their respective fields.

The global technology sector is dominated by a small group of increasingly diversified mega-caps, but the investment team believes that there are increasing opportunities in the vast number of companies not captured in the large behemoths of the space. The winners of tomorrow are unlikely to be the winners of today. The Fund is currently investing in mainly small and mid-cap companies, which provide more pure-play exposure into the emerging technologies than the sector's mega-caps.

Market Review

Equity markets exceeded expectations in 2023 as the likelihood of a soft landing increased on the back of resilient economic data throughout the year. Over the period, the MSCI ACWI returned +22.2% and the S&P 500 returned +26.3%. The rally was largely driven by technology stocks that appeared well-positioned to benefit from the adoption and enablement of artificial intelligence (AI). As such, the tech-heavy NASDAQ Composite rose +44.6% in its best year since 2020.

At the start of the year, fears of recession eased, and equities surged while market participants began to anticipate a near-term end to interest rate increases. Trades in March were driven by the perceived instability of the broader banking sector after the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank and Signature Bank. As the year progressed, global equities continued to seesaw as investors questioned the duration of the rate hike cycle on the back of mixed economic data with easing inflation and strong employment. The Fed delivered its last rate increase of 25 basis points (bps) in July after raising interest rates a total of 100bps in 2023. As indications of rate cuts emerged, equities broadly rallied and lifted indices through the end of the year. The S&P 500 rose for nine straight weeks to end the year in its best win streak since 2004.

Generative AI (genAI) dominated headlines and remained top of mind for both executives and investors in 2023. The power of genAI was broadly introduced to the public in late 2022 when OpenAI, a San Francisco-based startup, launched the chatbot ChatGPT. Hyperscalers, including Microsoft, Google, Amazon, and Meta, rapidly expanded their data centers with graphics processing units (GPUs) to try to stay ahead in the AI arms race. NVIDIA, credited with making genAI possible with accelerated computing, reached a market value of \$1.2 trillion in the year.

Outside of the 'Magnificent 7', the winning cohort of mega-cap tech stocks, AI began to affect nearly all aspects of the global economy. Among private companies, there was a spike in investment in AI startups, with 8 deals of at least \$500 million. Signs of AI's impact on the labor market emerged in Hollywood, where actors conducted a historic strike, partly due to concerns of competition from digital avatars. OpenAI also experienced a tumultuous period that included the firing and quick reinstatement of its founder CEO, Sam Altman.

Tech earnings reported over the year showcased mixed fundamentals across the sector. Results revealed softening demand as enterprises failed to commit to IT spending amid an uncertain macro backdrop. As mentioned, the mega-cap technology stocks that offer the silicon and supercomputers required to train and run genAl models outperformed as the cohort appeared as the initial enablers, adopters, and beneficiaries of the theme. Within semiconductors, companies that serve end-markets such as personal computers, smartphones, and automobiles, experienced muted demand over the period, while chip makers who manufacture the GPUs necessary to run Al tools benefitted.

Concurrently, both private and public tech firms prioritized cost reduction as a key strategy in 2023. Among others, Meta, Google, Microsoft, Salesforce, Spotify, and Uber concentrated on enhancing operational efficiency to improve their financial standing. This shift towards cost-efficiency in the tech sector, amidst a landscape of flat growth rates and burn multiples, appears to be the start of a new era of cost prudence with the higher interest rate regime.

Investment Outlook

Looking ahead, the Target Fund Managers believe that the proliferation of genAl and a more stable macroeconomic environment with lower rates creates the conditions for a potentially strong 2024 across the technology sector. The Target Fund Managers believe that we are in the early stages of a new era of intelligence led by a pivot to Al across the tech landscape. In 2024, the Target Fund Managers see additional investment opportunities moving up the Al stack in the data, data infrastructure, and application software layers.

Outside of AI, many of the secular trends in technology driving digital transformation in the global economy remain intact, and improving economic conditions may also catalyze a broader recovery beyond mega-cap and in more cyclical areas of technology. While growth assets have been penalized amidst rising rates, the fundamentals of the companies within the portfolio remain compelling. The secular growth trends driving technology are multi-year transformations that the Target Fund Managers expect to persist, regardless of the macroeconomic environment or geopolitical risk.
